Enabling Conditions

Initial Package Recommendation

Enabling Conditions - \$510M

Capacity - \$147.6M

- Solve for anticipated capacity changes in the district, ensuring the appropriate number of seats are available for students; scope could include:
 - Construction of new schools
 - Modifications of interior school space to accommodate enrollment changes

Quality Learning Environments - \$80.8M

- Address the differences in learning environments across school buildings in the district; scope could include:
 - Investments in older schools or non-traditional school buildings to address facility deficiencies impacting academics, logistics, or culture
 - Funding allotments for schools to select investments to bring key learning environment spaces up to standards
 - Facility investments to support departmental strategies

Critical Maintenance - \$281.1M

- Critical Maintenance looks to address the district's deferred maintenance opportunities. There are five components to critical maintenance:
 - Mechanical, Electrical, Plumbing (MEP)
 - ADA/Code
 - Environmental
 - Building Shell / Exterior
 - General Renovation

Model for 2024 Program

Eligibility: Which buildings can receive these program funds? What factors might exclude a building from receiving funds?

Revised proposal for eligible buildings:

Eligible School Buildings

- DPS owned or DPS leased buildings
 - Where DPS does not control the facility, DPS is limited to investing in non-fixed (non-attached) assets such as furniture (in order to ensure strong accountability for taxpayer dollars)
- Buildings constructed prior to 2000, and without a significant renovation
- Building is not receiving another significant project in the 2024 Bond removed this criterion in revised proposal (pending Subcommittee final decision)

123 buildings (75% of total DPS buildings) with approximately 59,000 students would be eligible. Regional distribution of eligible buildings and student population:

Exclusion ideas submitted by Subcommittee in survey:

- Project Cost Threshold: Maybe we could set a cost threshold for non-AC projects.
 Schools with existing projects exceeding that threshold would be excluded
- I propose a definition of an "other significant project": (i) a capital project that the CPAC has specifically identified for dunging in the bond, (ii) excluding air-conditioning (i.e., cooling) projects, (iii) that is **estimated to cost more than the building funding allocation [based on building sq. ft. and building type].**
- Any significant project that improves the learning environment (non-AC)
- Criteria could include: the budget of the larger/significant investment, number of students impacted by the project.
- Significant investment and/or impact on the performance of the building
- I think we could exclude upgrades that aren't basic needs. For example, AC is a
 basic need (thanks climate change!) but Innovation and Arts projects aren't basic
 needs.

If we decide to add building eligibility exclusion criteria, we won't know until the end of the CPAC process which buildings are receiving other significant Bond projects. Therefore, we'll need the Committee to decide how to reallocate the funds from Focused Learning Environment Program "savings" for those buildings.

Re-allocation ideas submitted by Subcommittee in survey:

- Allocate to Maintenance (54.5%)
- Keep within QLE apply towards Ed Suitability/Dept Request project list (36.4%)
- Provide additional funding into Capacity Fund for Center Programs (27.3%)
- Provide additional funding into Capacity Utilization Funds (18.2%)

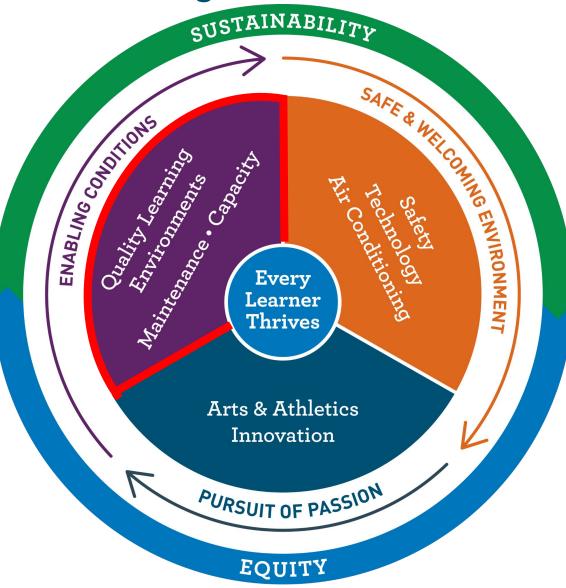

Approach to Equity - Equity Index

As prioritization was evaluated, we used a method to evaluate district-wide equity and equality through an Equity Index that defines a baseline for ALL schools/programs with greater rigor beyond family income.

<u>Student Equity-</u> Providing the resources that students need for success. For measuring student equity, we used the following index:

<u>School % High Poverty + %English Learner + %SPED +%Volatility</u> District Average % High Poverty + %English Learner + %SPED +%Volatility

This is in line with how DPS allocates student-based funding.

What is the Data?

- District average Equity Index (EI) is 1.0
- You can read an El of 1.1 as that school having 10% above average population of students with greater needs. An El of 0.7 indicates that school has 30% smaller than average population of harder-to-serve students.
